AN ACT PROVIDING FOR AN ADDITIONAL COURT OFFICER FOR THE CENTRAL DISTRICT COURT OF NORTHERN ESSEX.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 62 of chapter 218 of the General Laws is hereby
2 amended by striking out the first sentence, as most recently
3 amended by chapter 898 of the acts of 1971, and inserting in
4 place thereof the following sentence: – In the municipal court of
5 the city of Boston the court officers appointed shall not exceed
6 ten for criminal business, one of whom shall be designated by the
7 chief justice as chief court officer of said court for criminal
8 business and one as an assistant chief court officer, nor five for
9 civil business, one of whom shall be designated by said chief
10 justice as chief court officer of said court for civil business; in the
11 municipal court of the Roxbury district ten court officers may
12 be appointed, of whom one shall be designated by the justice of
13 said court as chief court officer and one as assistant chief court
14 officer; in the municipal court of the Dorchester district seven
15 court officers may be appointed of whom one shall be designated
16 by the justice of said court as chief court officer and one as
17 assistant chief court officer; in the third district court of eastern
18 Middlesex and in the district court of Springfield six court
19 officers may be appointed; in the central district court of
20 Worcester five court officers may be appointed; in the municipal
21 court of the West Roxbury district and in the first district court
22 of eastern Middlesex four court officers may be appointed; in the
23 East Boston district court three court officers may be appointed,
24 of whom one shall be designated by the justice of said court as
25 chief court officer; in the district court of Chelsea, in the district
26 court of Somerville, in the district court of East Norfolk, in the
27 district court of Central Middlesex, in the first district court of
28 southern Middlesex, in the second district court of eastern
29 Middlesex, in the fourth district court of eastern Middlesex and

30 in the district court of Lowell three court officers may be
31 appointed; in the third district court of Bristol, in the district
32 court of Brockton, in the municipal court of Brookline, in the
33 municipal courts of the South Boston district and of the
34 Charlestown district, the district court of Hampshire, the district
35 court of Newton, the first district court of Barnstable, the third
36 district court of southern Worcester, the district court of
37 northern Norfolk, the second district court of Plymouth, the first
38 district court of Essex, the district court of Lawrence, and the
39 central district court of northern Essex two court officers may be
40 appointed; and in each of the other district courts in the
41 commonwealth, one court officer may be appointed.
