Carey and another for the payment from the state treasury of a sum of money to James M. Loughran of Boston for wrongful imprisonment for a crime he did not commit; the recommitted petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 4238) of George W. Shattuck and others relative to the payment from the state treasury of a sum of money to Edward L. Anderson, Vernon H. Griffin, Richard A. Eayrs and Bernard Davis of Shirley to compensate them for damages caused by inmates of the Industrial School for Boys at Shirley; the recommitted petition (accompanied

by resolve, House, No. 4803) of Michael J. Harrigan and Vernon R. Farnsworth, Jr., for the payment from the state treasury of a sum of money to volunteer workers in the Springfield juvenile court on the project designated "Operation Good Citizen"; the recommitted petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4806) of Peter C. McCarthy relative to the law providing compensation for victims of violent crimes; the petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 687) of John G. Harvard for the payment from the state treasury of a sum of money to said John G. Harvard of Dudley for illegal detention at the Massachusetts Correctional Institution at Concord; the petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 883) of Edward W. Connelly for an investigation by a special commission (including members of the General Court) relative to the methods of improving the fiscal system of the Commonwealth; the petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 884) of Janet Mitchell for the payment from the state treasury of a sum of money to said Janet Mitchell of Boston for injuries sustained in the lobby of the Massachusetts Mental Health Center located in the Roxbury district of the city of Boston; the petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 1274) of M. Joseph Manning for the payment from the state treasury of a certain sum of money to Leonard Murphy for certain medical expenses incurred by him as the result of an accident to his son Gregory Murphy of Scituate; the petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 1275) of Howard R. Lee and Peter L. Masnik for the payment from the state treasury of a certain sum of money to said Howard R. Lee for having been illegally detained at the Bridgewater State Hospital; and the petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 2436) of the Massachusetts Department of Public Works Engineers, Local 780, for the payment from the treasury of the Commonwealth to Kenneth S. Molin of Swampscott of a sum of money for legal expenses incurred by him in defense of criminal charges arising out of his official conduct as an employees of the Department of Public Works, report recommending that the accompanying order (House, No. 5466) ought to be adopted.
