AN ACT PROVIDING THAT CERTAIN LIBRARIANS SHALL NOT BE COMPELLED TO WORK ON SUNDAYS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Chapter 149 of the General Laws is hereby amended by adding
- 2 the following section: —
- 3 *Section 33E.* Notwithstanding any provisions of law to the
- 4 contrary, no person employed as a librarian by a city or town shall
- 5 be required to work on Sunday, provided that any person who
- 6 voluntarily does work shall be compensated therefor at the rate of
- 7 one and one-half times their usual compensation.
