RESOLVE PROVIDING FOR AN INVESTIGATION AND STUDY BY A SPECIAL COMMISSION RELATIVE TO REVIEWING THE DISABILITY RETIREMENT SYSTEM IN THE COMMONWEALTH.

1     *Resolved*, That a special commission, to consist of three  
2 members of the senate, five members of the house of representatives,  
3 the secretary of administration and finance or his designee, the  
4 secretary of public safety, or his designee, the state treasurer or his  
5 designee, and two persons to be appointed by the governor, is  
6 hereby established for the purpose of making an investigation and  
7 study of the retirement system of the commonwealth, with particu-  
8 lar emphasis on the disability retirement aspect.

9     Said commission shall consider the possibility of employing  
10 those who are retired because of disability in another capacity  
11 within the department from whence they were retired. Said com-  
12 mission should also consider the possibility of developing rules  
13 and regulations to discourage early retirements by individuals who  
14 are either partially disabled or under the age of sixty years. Said  
15 commission shall report to the general court, the results of its  
16 investigation and study, and recommendations, if any, together  
17 with drafts of such legislation as may be necessary to carry such  
18 recommendations into effect, by filing the same with the clerk of  
19 the house of representatives on or before the first Wednesday of  
20 June, nineteen hundred and eighty-four.
