AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE TREASURER OF NORFOLK COUNTY TO PAY CERTAIN UNPAID BILLS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The treasurer of Norfolk County with the appro-  
2 val of the county commissioners, is hereby authorized to pay from  
3 any available funds during the current fiscal year, such of the  
4 unpaid bills incurred by said county and totalling Ten Thousand  
5 Seven Hundred and Seventy-Two Dollars and fifty-four cents as  
6 set forth in a list on file in the office of the Director of Accounts in  
7 the Department of Revenue for goods supplied and services rendered  
8 to said county during the years nineteen hundred and  
9 seventy-four through nineteen hundred and eighty-two, which  
10 bills are legally unenforceable against said county by reason of  
11 their being incurred in excess of available appropriations, said  
12 amount to be paid from any available funds of said county.

1 SECTION 2. No bill shall be approved by the county commis-  
2 sioners of said county for payment, or paid by the county treasurer  
3 thereof, under the authority of this act, unless and until a certifi-  
4 cate has been signed and filed with said county treasurer stating,  
5 under the penalties of perjury, that the goods or services for which  
6 such bill had been submitted were ordered by an official or an  
7 employee of said county, and that such goods were delivered and  
8 actually received by said county and that such services were actu-  
9 ally received by said county and that such services were actually  
10 rendered to said county.

1 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

The Constitution of the United States

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People in each State, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators in that State.

Section 4. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State; and they shall meet in one or more Cities, which shall have the Qualification requisite for Electors in that State, and they shall vote for all the Electors in that State, and they shall have the Qualification requisite for Electors in that State.
