To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

I am filing herewith a supplemental appropriation request.


I am requesting additional funding for the Secretary of State's office. This funding is necessary to ensure that polls at the March 13, 1984 presidential primary are open for thirteen hours as mandated by Chapter 503 of the Acts of 1983.

I am also requesting additional funding to meet obligations under the Mental Health/Mental Retardation Consent Decrees. This funding is necessary to maintain current levels of personnel at the state schools for the mentally retarded, and to fund community placements required by the mental retardation consent decrees and the Brewster consent decree.

Finally, I am requesting appropriation language to implement a program of tax collection by the Department of Revenue as authorized by section 99 of Chapter 233 of the Acts of 1983.

I urge your immediate favorable consideration of this supplemental appropriation request.

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE THE THIRTIETH, NINETEEN HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-FOUR TO PROVIDE FOR SUPPLEMENTING CERTAIN EXISTING APPROPRIATIONS AND FOR CERTAIN NEW ACTIVITIES AND PROJECTS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. To provide for supplementing certain items in the
2 general appropriation act and for certain new activities and pro-
3 jects, the sums set forth in section two for the several purposes and
4 subject to the provisions of law regulating the disbursement of
5 public funds and the conditions pertaining to appropriations in
6 chapter two hundred and eighty-nine of the acts of nineteen
7 hundred and eighty-three, for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth,
8 nineteen hundred and eighty-four or for such period as may be
9 specified, the sums so appropriated to be in addition to any
10 amounts available for the purpose.

1 SECTION 3. For a special program of tax collection through
2 contracts with private collection agencies authorized pursuant to
3 section 99 of chapter 233 of the acts of 1983, the department of
4 revenue may expend for services rendered by said agencies an
5 amount not exceeding 35 percent of the total taxes collected pursu-
6 ant to this program from that portion, not exceeding \$300 million,
7 of unpaid taxes owed to the Commonwealth which the commis-
