## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty-Five.

AN ACT CHANGING THE RETIREMENT AGE OF MEMBERS OF THE MASSACHUSETTS STATE POLICE TO 55 YEARS OLD.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

- 1 The mandatory retirement age of members of the Massachusetts
- 2 State Police shall be 55 years of age. After 20 years of service and
- 3 having reached the age of 50 years old, the pension for that 5 year
- 4 period should be 2½% per year, not to exceed 80%.

In the Senate of the United States of America, on the 1st day of January, 1900, the following bill was introduced and read twice and passed.

**The General Act of January 1st, 1900**

Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, January 1st, 1900.
