Ordered, That the Committee on the Judiciary be authorized to sit during the session and during the recess of the General Court for the purpose of making an investigation and study of the subject matter of certain House documents relative to criminal procedure.

Said Committee shall be provided with quarters in the State House or elsewhere, may hold hearings, may travel within the Commonwealth, and may expend for clerical and other services such sums as may be appropriated therefor. Said Committee shall report to the General Court the results of its investigation and study and its recommendations, if any, together with the drafts of legislation necessary to carry such recommendations into effect by filing the same with the Clerk of the House of Representatives on or before the last Wednesday in December nineteen hundred and eighty-five.
