AN ACT PROVIDING THAT THE OFFICE OF ASSISTANT MANAGER OF THE MUNICIPAL LIGHTING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PEABODY SHALL BE SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE CIVIL SERVICE LAW.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 2 of chapter 286 of the acts of 1951 is
2 hereby amended by striking out the second sentence, as most
3 recently amended by section 1 of chapter 431 of the acts of 1953,
4 and inserting in place thereof the following sentence: — Said man-
5 ager and assistant manager shall not be members of the commission
6 and the manager shall not be subject to the provisions of chapter 31
7 of the General Laws and the rules made thereunder.

1 SECTION 2. The present incumbent of the office of assistant
2 manager is hereby granted tenure subject to the provisions of
3 chapter 31 of the General Laws.
