AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE OFFICE OF THIRD ASSISTANT CLERK IN THE DISTRICT COURT OF SPRINGFIELD.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The second paragraph of section 10 of
2 chapter 218 of the General Laws, as amended, is hereby
3 further amended by inserting after the word "Middle-
4 sex" in line 5, the words:— the district court of
5 Springfield, — so as to read as follows:— Third as-
6 sistant clerks with salaries payable by the county may
7 be appointed in the municipal court of the Roxbury
8 district, the municipal court of the Dorchester dis-
9 trict and, subject to the approval of the county com-
10 missioners, in the first district court of eastern Middle-
11 sex, the district court of Springfield, the third district
12 court of eastern Middlesex and the district court of
13 East Norfolk.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take full effect upon its
2 acceptance during the current year by vote of the
3 county commissioners of the county of Hampden, but
4 not otherwise.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA
 AS AMENDED BY THE THIRTEENTH, FOURTEENTH, FIFTEENTH,
 SIXTEENTH, AND SEVENTEENTH AMENDMENTS.

Approved by the Senate and House of Representatives
 of the United States of America, September 17, 1787.

1. Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.
 2. Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People in each State, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
 3. No Representative shall, when chosen, have been seven Years in the United States, nor shall he, when elected, be less than twenty five Years of Age, and seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and when elected shall have been seven Years a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen.
 4. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
 5. The House of Representatives shall elect their Speaker and other Officers; and they shall choose their Clerks.
 6. The House of Representatives may, from time to time, elect other Officers, whose Duties they shall determine.
 7. The House of Representatives shall assemble on the first Monday in December, but they may, by Law, provide for one or more Sessions in any Year, and may adjourn from Time to Time, but not for more than seven Days, and they may, by Law, provide for the Calling of a special Session thereof.
 8. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
 9. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
 10. The Senate shall elect their President and Vice President, and they shall choose their Clerks.
 11. The Senate may, from time to time, elect other Officers, whose Duties they shall determine.
 12. The Senate shall assemble on the first Monday in October, but they may, by Law, provide for one or more Sessions in any Year, and may adjourn from Time to Time, but not for more than seven Days, and they may, by Law, provide for the Calling of a special Session thereof.

1. Section 3. The electors shall meet in one or more States, and shall vote for President and Vice President, and for Senators, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
 2. Section 4. The electors shall meet in one or more States, and shall vote for President and Vice President, and for Senators, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
 3. Section 5. The electors shall meet in one or more States, and shall vote for President and Vice President, and for Senators, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
