RESOLUTIONS MEMORIALIZING CONGRESS TO ENACT LEGISLATION REQUIRING UNIVERSAL MILITARY TRAINING.

1 *Resolved*, That the general court of Massachusetts
2 in session assembled hereby urges the Congress of
3 the United States to enact legislation requiring uni-
4 versal military training; and be it further

5 *Resolved*, That copies of these resolutions be sent
6 forthwith by the secretary of the commonwealth to
7 the President of the United States, to the presiding
8 officer of each branch of Congress, and to the members
9 thereof from this commonwealth.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 1, Clause 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

1. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

2. No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, seven Years, and be seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and when elected shall have been seven Years a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen.
