

HOUSE No. 1026

By Mr. Scaccia of Boston, petition of Angelo M. Scaccia and Brian J. Donnelly that the Metropolitan District Commission be directed to construct and maintain a playground in the Mattapan section of Ward 18 in the city of Boston. Urban Affairs.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Five.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION BY THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION OF A PLAYGROUND ON METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION PARK LAND IN MATTAPAN.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 The metropolitan district commission is hereby authorized
2 and directed to construct and maintain a playground with
3 suitable structures and facilities on metropolitan district com-
4 mission park land in the Belnel Village area of Mattapan,
5 section of Ward 18, Boston. For said purposes said commission
6 may expend such sums as may be appropriated therefor.

It is the duty of every citizen to support the laws of the United States and to pay the taxes thereon. The Government is authorized to collect these taxes and to use the proceeds for the benefit of the Nation.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I, Section 8, Clause 1. The Congress shall have the following Powers: To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imports and Exports, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, to borrow Money on the credit of the United States, to define and punish the Offences against the Law of Nations, to define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations, to regulate the Coinage, Weights and Measures, to establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, to establish an uniform Bankruptcy Law, to regulate the Commerce among the several States, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, to exercise exclusive Legislation over all Districts ceded to the United States, to exercise exclusive Legislation respecting the District of Columbia, to exercise the same exclusive Legislation in all Cases where the United States may be interested, to exercise the same exclusive Legislation in all Cases arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and in all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, to exercise the same exclusive Legislation in all Cases of Impeachment, to make all Laws necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States.

Article II, Section 1, Clause 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States, who shall hold his Office for a Term of Years, which shall not exceed four, and shall be eligible to a second Term, but no Person shall be elected President who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, who was seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who, when elected, shall not have been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.

Article III, Section 1, Clause 1. The judicial Power shall be vested in one or more Supreme Courts, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the Supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at any time during their Continuance in Office, receive a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.
