RESOLUTIONS MEMORIALIZING THE U.S. CONGRESS TO RESTORE TO THE MONARCH OF ENGLAND THE RIGHT OF VETO OVER THE USE OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS AS A PATENT RIGHT OR TRADE SECRET NECESSARY FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF NUCLEAR REACTORS ON A USEFUL BASIS AS REQUIRED UNDER ARTICLE I SECTION 8 OF THE UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION WHICH DEALS WITH THE POWERS OF CONGRESS.

1 *Resolved*, Whereas the right and duty of the Monarch of  
2 England to employ veto power must be redefined as a patent  
3 right (or trade secret) good forever which is of great value in the  
4 development of nuclear reactors on a profitable basis with  
5 reduction of contamination of the air particularly when this  
6 right and duty is shared as a right and duty of the heads of state  
7 of the other nuclear powers as a basis for permanently banning  
8 atomic weapons through a series of bilateral (two-party)  
9 International patent licensing agreements covering the develop-  
10 ment of atomic fuel stations.

11 Therefore, be it resolved that the Massachusetts House of  
12 Representatives hereby memorializes the U.S. Congress to  
13 restore the right of the Monarch of England to veto the use of  
14 nuclear weapons (a right of King George VI of England which  
15 was suspended until December 31, 1973 by the McMahon Act of  
16 U.S. Congress in the mistaken belief that this was a military  
17 right).
