The Committee on the Treasury, to whom was committed the Resolve in favor of the State Prison at Concord, report that the same ought to pass with the following amendments: Strike out the word "twenty" in the third line, and strike out in the seventh, eighth and ninth lines, the words "twenty thousand dollars for the construction of five double-tenement dwelling-houses, to be rented to the officers of said prison."

RESOLVE

In favor of the State Prison at Concord.

Resolved, That there be allowed and paid, out of the treasury of the Commonwealth, a sum not exceeding twenty-eight thousand dollars, to be expended under the direction of the commissioners of prisons, at the state prison at Concord, for the following purposes, to wit: twenty thousand dollars for the construction of five double-tenement dwelling-houses, to be rented to the officers of said prison; three thousand dollars for the construction of coal-sheds; and five thousand dollars for repairs and alterations in prison cells and buildings.
