AN ACT

To amend Chapter Fourteen of the Public Statutes concerning the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

1 SECTION 1. Section one hundred and thirty of
2 chapter fourteen of the Public Statutes is hereby
3 amended to read as follows: "There shall be
4 allowed and paid to officers and soldiers of the
5 volunteer militia on rolls and accounts in such form
6 as the commander-in-chief may prescribe, as follows,
7 to wit: for the duty prescribed in sections one hun-
8 dred, one hundred and one, one hundred and eight,
9 one hundred and nine, one hundred and thirteen,
10 and one hundred and seventeen, commissioned
11 officers shall hereafter be allowed and paid the same
12 pay per diem as is prescribed for officers of like
13 grade in the United States army, viz., brigadier-

14 general, fifteen dollars and twenty-eight cents ;
15 colonel, nine dollars and seventy-three cents ; lieu-
16 tenant-colonel, eight dollars and thirty-three cents ;
17 major, six dollars and ninety-five cents ; captain,
18 mounted, five dollars and fifty-five cents ; captain,
19 not mounted, five dollars ; adjutant, quartermaster,
20 and paymaster, five dollars ; first lieutenant, mounted,
21 four dollars and seventy-five cents ; first lieutenant,
22 not mounted, four dollars and seventeen cents ;
23 second lieutenant, mounted, four dollars and seven-
24 teen cents ; second lieutenant, not mounted, three
25 dollars and eighty-nine cents ; chaplain, four dollars
26 and seventeen cents ; non-commissioned staff officers,
27 two dollars and fifty cents ; every member of a band,
28 four dollars ; and every other enlisted man, two
29 dollars. And there shall be allowed for each horse
30 actually employed by officers and soldiers authorized
31 by law to be mounted, and for such draft-horse em-
32 ployed in the artillery, the sum of four dollars per
33 day, which shall be in full for all keeping and
34 forage.

35 For all other duty under orders of the commander-
36 in-chief, unless otherwise specially provided, or as a
37 witness or defendant under summons, as provided in
38 section one hundred and forty-three, there shall be
39 allowed and paid to each general, field, and staff
40 officer, the sum of four dollars ; to every other com-
41 missioned officer, the sum of two dollars and fifty
42 cents ; to every member of a band, the sum of four
43 dollars ; and to every other enlisted man, the sum of
44 two dollars per day.

45 To each assistant adjutant-general of brigade there
46 shall be allowed and paid the sum of twenty dollars
47 per annum; to each adjutant, the sum of fifty dollars
48 per annum; and to each paymaster, the sum of
49 twelve dollars and fifty cents per annum for each
50 company in the command to which he is attached.
51 There shall be allowed and paid to each officer
52 detailed by competent authority to perform the
53 duties of another the pay and allowances of the
54 grade or office so filled: *provided*, that no officer
55 shall be paid for duty under two officers at the same
56 time, nor two offices for the same duty.

1 SECT. 2. So much of sections one hundred and
2 eight, one hundred and eleven, one hundred, one
3 hundred and one, one hundred and nine, one hun-
4 dred and thirteen, one hundred and seventeen, one
5 hundred and thirty, and one hundred and forty-three
6 of the Public Statutes, and all other sections or parts
7 of sections inconsistent with this act are hereby re-
8 pealed.

1 SECT. 3. This act shall take effect upon its pas-
2 sage.
