The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE PORT OF BOSTON AUTHORITY
TO INSURE REAL AND PERSONAL PROPERTY WITHIN
ITS CHARGE.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the
same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 91A of the General Laws is
2 hereby amended by inserting after section 6 the
3 following new section: —

4 *Section 6A.* The Authority may insure real and
5 personal property of the commonwealth within the
6 charge of the Authority with such kinds of insurance,
7 in such amounts, and with such forms of policies of
8 insurance as the Authority may determine.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.

The Act shall be in full force and effect from the date of its passage, and shall remain in force until the date of the next session of the Legislature, unless otherwise provided.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year of the Thousand Nine Hundred and Six

Section 1. The Board of Commissioners of the State Police shall have the honor and duty to report to the Governor at the first session of the Legislature after the expiration of each year, a report of the operations of the State Police during the year.

Section 2. The Board of Commissioners of the State Police shall have the honor and duty to report to the Governor at the first session of the Legislature after the expiration of each year, a report of the operations of the State Police during the year.

Section 3. Chapter 117 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after section 1 the following new section:

Section 1A. The Authority may incur and use the personal property of the Commonwealth within the limits of its Authority with such kind of insurance as it may determine, and with such kind of policy as it may determine, and the Authority may determine.

Section 4. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
