The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT AND SUBSEQUENT ELECTION OF CERTAIN JUDGES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 The judges of the superior, municipal and district
- 2 courts shall be appointed and thereafter elected in
- 3 accordance with the Missouri plan, so called.

The bill is reported by the committee on the subject of the proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of New York, and is intended to amend the constitution of the State of New York in relation to the office of the Governor of the State of New York.

The Constitution of the State of New York

In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eight

At the City of New York, this 1st day of January, 1908.

It is enacted by the Senate and Assembly of the State of New York, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the people of the State, that

1. The office of the Governor of the State of New York shall be held for a term of four years, beginning on the 1st day of January next following the election of the Governor.
2. The Governor shall be elected and qualified on the 1st day of January next following the election of the Governor.
3. The Governor shall be elected and qualified on the 1st day of January next following the election of the Governor.
