AN ACT FURTHER REGULATING THE FILING OF NOMINATION PAPERS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The second paragraph of section 7 of chapter 53
2 of the General Laws, as appearing in the 1992 Official Edition, is
3 hereby amended by adding the following sentence: — In those
4 cases where an incumbent is not seeking the office all filing dates
5 hereunder shall be extended by seven days.

1 SECTION 2. Section 10 of said chapter 53, as so appearing, is
2 hereby amended by adding the following paragraph: —
3 In those cases where an incumbent is not seeking the office all
4 filing dates hereunder shall be extended by seven days.

1 SECTION 3. Section 48 of said chapter 53, as so appearing, is
2 hereby amended by inserting after the third paragraph the
3 following paragraph:—
4 In those cases where an incumbent is not seeking the office all
5 filing dates hereunder shall be extended by seven days.
