AN ACT PROHIBITING FURLOUGHS FOR PERSONS CONVICTED OF FELONIES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 90A of Chapter 127 of the General Laws, as appearing
2 in the 1992 Official Edition, is hereby amended by striking out in
3 lines 8 to 15, inclusive, the following: —
4 “life sentence or a sentence in a state correctional facility for
5 violation of section thirteen, thirteen B, fourteen, fifteen, fifteen
6 A, fifteen B, sixteen, seventeen eighteen, eighteen A, nineteen,
7 twenty, twenty-one, twenty-one, twenty-two A, twenty-three,
8 twenty-four, twenty-four B, twenty-five or section twenty-six of
9 chapter two hundred and sixty-five, or section seventeen, thirty-
10 four, thirty-five, or section thirty-five A of chapter two hundred
11 and seventy-two, or for an attempt to commit any crime referred
12 to in said sections”, and inserting in place thereof the
13 following:— sentence upon conviction of a felony.
