AN ACT TO INCREASE MINIMUM AID UNDER CHAPTER 70.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 2 of Chapter 70 of the Acts of 1993 is hereby changed
- 2 and following substituted thereof . . .
- 3 Minimum aid: the amount of minimum state school aid avail-
- 4 able to a municipality in fiscal year nineteen hundred and ninety-
- 5 seven shall be one hundred dollars multiplied by the district foun-
- 6 dation enrollment and one hundred dollars multiplied by the
- 7 district foundation enrollment each year thereafter until fiscal
- 8 year two thousand and one.
