AN ACT DIRECTING THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION TO CONSTRUCT A WATER STORAGE TANK IN THE TOWN OF STONEHAM AND TO CONSTRUCT WATER MAINS IN THE TOWNS OF STONEHAM AND WAKEFIELD AND IN THE CITY OF WOBURN AND INCREASING THE FUNDS WHICH THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION MAY EXPEND TO CONSTRUCT A WATER MAIN IN THE CITY OF WOBURN.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The M.D.C. is hereby authorized to construct a
2 Water Storage facility and construct a water main in the Town of
3 Stoneham for the purpose of providing adequate storage and to
4 equalize flows; and to extend the construction of an existing
5 water main in the City of Woburn in Montvale Avenue to Main
6 Street in Stoneham and thence to the Stoneham-Wakefield town
7 line for the purpose of supplying additional water to the towns of
8 Stoneham and Wakefield; also additional funds to construct a
9 water main in the City of Woburn from an existing 36-inch main
10 at the intersection of Montvale Avenue and Washington Street
11 through the City of Woburn to Mishawum Road, Woburn, for
12 the purpose of furnishing water supply to the City of Woburn,
13 authorized by Chapter 982 of the Acts of 1971. Said commission
14 for the purposes aforesaid may acquire, install and operate such
15 water mains and other appurtenances as may from time to time
16 be found necessary or advisable.

17 Engineering and administrative expenses, including but not
18 limited to personnel, materials, supplies and transportation costs
19 incurred under this act, shall be considered as part of the direct
20 cost of the projects and works for which they are incurred.

21 In case federal funds or federal assistance is made available to
22 the commonwealth for projects authorized by this act, such funds
23 or assistance shall be in addition to the sums herein authorized;
24 provided that such funds, when received, shall be deposited in the
25 state treasury and be available for expenditure subject to the
26 provisions of law regulating the disbursement of public funds and
27 the approval thereof.

1 SECTION 2. The state treasurer may borrow from time to
2 time on the credit of the commonwealth such sums of money as
3 may be necessary for the purpose of meeting payments as
4 authorized by this act and may issue and renew from time to time
5 notes of the commonwealth therefor, bearing interest payable at
6 such time and at such rates as shall be fixed by the state treasurer.
7 Such notes shall be issued and may be renewed one or more times
8 for such terms, not exceeding one year, as the governor may
9 recommend to the general court in accordance with Section 3 of
10 Article LXII of the Amendments to the Constitution of the
11 Commonwealth, but the final maturities of such notes, whether
12 original or renewal, shall be not later than three years from the
13 date of the original issue. Notwithstanding any provision of this
14 act, such notes shall be part of the debt of the metropolitan water
15 district.

1 SECTION 3. To meet the expenditure necessary in carrying
2 out the provisions of this act or to refinance notes issued as
3 provided in section two of this act, the state treasurer shall, upon
4 request of the governor, issue and sell at public or private sale
5 bonds of the commonwealth registered or with interest coupons
6 attached, as he may deem best to an amount to be specified by the
7 governor from time to time, but not exceeding, in the aggregate,
8 the sum of six million dollars. All bonds issued by the
9 commonwealth, as aforesaid, shall be designated on their face,
10 Metropolitan Water District Additional Loan Act of 1976 and
11 shall be on the serial payment plan for such maximum terms of

12 years, not exceeding thirty years, as the governor may
13 recommend to the general court pursuant to Section 3 of Article
14 LXII of the Amendments to the Constitution of the Com-
15 monwealth, the maturities thereof to be so arranged that the
16 amounts payable in the several years of the period of
17 amortization other than the final year shall be as nearly equal as
18 in the opinion of the state treasurer it is practicable to make them.
19 Said bonds shall bear interest semi-annually at such rate as the
20 state treasurer, with the approval of the governor, shall fix. The
21 initial maturities of such bonds be payable not later than one year
22 from the date of issue thereof and the entire issue not later than
23 June the thirtieth, two thousand and eleven. All interest payments
24 and payments on account of principal on such obligations shall
25 be part of the debt and expenses of the metropolitan water
26 district.

1 SECTION 4. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
