AN ACT RELATIVE TO MENTAL HEALTH.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 126 of the General Laws, as appearing in
- the 2000 Official Edition, is hereby amended by inserting, after
- section 27, the following new section:
- Section 28. Mental Health Examinations and Services.
- The sheriff shall ensure that each person admitted to a county
- correctional facility, including a house of correction or jail, shall
- have access to mental health care consistent with his or her needs.
- Mental health care shall include but not be limited to suicide

9 screening, mental health and substance abuse screening upon
10 admission or transfer to a facility; mental health assessment
11 within two weeks of admission or transfer and periodically there-
12 after; a comprehensive mental health evaluation within a time
13 frame appropriate to the level or urgency; suicide prevention;
14 crisis intervention; an individualized plan of care; psychiatric
15 services, including medication and medication monitoring; indi-
16 vidual and group psychotherapy; evaluation for transfer to a
17 mental health facility; and discharge planning, including referral
18 to appropriate mental health services at the time of release and
19 sufficient medication for continued treatment until enrollment in a
20 public or private health plan.

21 a. Each such correctional facility shall comply with the princi-
22 ples and guidelines of the current version of the American Psychi-
23 atric Association Task Force Report on Psychiatric Services in
24 Jails and Prisons, or such higher standards as the sheriff may
25 require, with respect to the provision of mental health care.

26 b. The department of mental health shall inspect each such cor-
27 rectional facility at least annually to determine compliance with
28 this section. The commissioner of mental health shall make a
29 report of the findings and any recommendations from each inspec-
30 tion to the sheriff, including any recommendations for revisions to
31 the standards for the provision of mental health care.

32 c. The sheriff shall require in each such correctional facility
33 periodic training of administrative, health care and correctional
34 staff in the care of persons who are suicidal and/or mentally ill
35 and shall, in consultation with the commissioner of mental health,
36 develop protocols for such training.

1 SECTION 2. The department of mental health shall file an
2 annual report of its inspections of mental health care in county
3 correctional facilities for the prior year, including any recommen-
4 dations, with the secretary of the executive office of public safety,
5 the secretary of the executive office of health and human services,
6 the commissioner of corrections, each sheriff, the house and
7 senate committees on ways and means, the joint committee on
8 human services and elderly affairs and the mental health caucus.

1 SECTION 3. Chapter 127 of the General Laws, as appearing in
2 the 2000 Official Edition, is hereby amended by inserting, after
3 section 17, the following new section:

4 Section 17A. Mental Health Examinations and Services.

5 The commissioner shall ensure that each person admitted to a
6 state correctional facility, with the exception of Bridgewater State
7 Hospital, the Treatment Center for Sexually Dangerous Persons,
8 and the Addiction Center at Southeastern Correctional Center,
9 shall have access to mental health care consistent with his or her
10 needs. Mental health care shall include but not be limited to sui-
11 cide screening, mental health and substance abuse screening upon
12 admission or transfer and periodically thereafter; a comprehensive
13 mental health evaluation within a time frame appropriate to the
14 level of urgency; suicide prevention; crisis intervention; an indi-
15 vidualized plan of care; psychiatric services, including medication
16 and medication monitoring; individual and group psychotherapy;
17 evaluation for transfer to a mental health facility; and discharge
18 planning, including referral to appropriate mental health services
19 at the time of release and sufficient medication for continued
20 treatment until enrollment in a public or private health plan.
