AN ACT

Relating to the Discharge of Poor Convicts.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

1 SECTION 1. Section seventeen of chapter two hun-
2 dred and twenty-two of the Public Statutes is hereby
3 amended by inserting after the word " court," in the
4 fifth line, the following words: [A] " and in case
5 there is no police or district court in the county,
6 then to any trial justice in said county"; also by
7 inserting after the word " court," in the sixth line,
8 the words [B] " or trial justice" [C]; also by insert-

9 ing after the word " court," in the eleventh line, the
10 words [D] " or trial justice " [E].

1 SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its pas-
2 sage.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, April 13, 1882.

At [D], same section, strike out the word " or."

At [E], same section, insert the words " or justices of the
peace."
