

This annual report provides information on admissions to substance abuse treatment services. Data were reported to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, Bureau of Substance Abuse Services Management Information System (SAMIS) in FY 2007. SAMIS data include information reported by all BSAS licensed substance abuse treatment programs for FY 1997 to FY 2007.

Overall Treatment Admissions

In FY 2007, there were 31,245 women admitted to substance abuse treatment services in Massachusetts (29% of total admissions); of these 482 admissions were under 18 years of age. This report presents data on adults 18 and older. For information on substance abuse treatment services provided to clients under 18, please refer to the Adolescent Annual Report. Figure 1 illustrates treatment admissions trend for adults 18 years and older to residential and outpatient services for Fiscal Years 1997 through 2007.




Characteristics of Adult Admissions

In FY 2007, female adult admissions to substance abuse treatment reported the following characteristics:

- 81.4% (25,039) were White, 7.9% (2,423) were Black, 7.5% (2,294) were Latino and 3.3% (1,007) were other.
- 80.5% (24,767) were unemployed.
- 16.9% (5,196) were homeless.
- 48.1% (14,782) had received prior mental health treatment.
- 31.6% (9,735) reported injection drug use (past year).
- 59.8% (18,387) were between the ages of 21-39, with a mean age of 34.5 years.
- 24.7% (7,606) had children under six years of age, 40.2% (3,058) of these admissions reported living with their children. Thirty-seven percent (11,338) were the parents of children 6-18 years old, 37.1% (4,210) of these admissions reported living with their children.


Primary Substance of Use

In FY 2007, adult female admissions reported alcohol and heroin most often as the primary drug for which they were seeking treatment. Of all admissions 37.3% (11,472) reported alcohol as primary substance of use, 36.1% (11,099) heroin, 6.4% (1,961) crack, 5.4% (1,665) cocaine, 3.7% (1,138) marijuana, 11.1% (3,428) *other* drugs.



Substances Used in Past Year


In FY 2007, at admissions alcohol remained the most reported substance used in the past year among adult female clients. The percentages of past year use add up to more than 100% due to poly-drug use. Of all admissions 62.6% (19,256) reported past year alcohol use, 40.8% (12,549) heroin, 32.1% (9,863) cocaine, 24.4% (7,529) crack, 23.5% (7,229) marijuana, and 47.3% (15,051) *other* drugs (other opiates/synthetics 20.7% (6,384), Tranquilizers 17.1% (5,266)).



Admissions by Service Type

In FY 2007, adult female admissions received services in the following service modalities:

- 39.6% (12,198were admitted to Short Term Residential Services (less than 30 days) including Acute Treatment Services (11,250), Transitional Support Services (927)*, and Post-Detox/Pre Recovery (21).
- 45.2% (13,900) received Outpatient Services including Day Treatment (2,075), Outpatient Counseling (6,532), County Corrections (84), Case Management (337), Compulsive Gambling (23), Acupuncture Detox (157), Expanded Treatment Services (278), Narcotic Treatment (2,326), 1st Offender Drunk Driver (2,132), and 2nd Offender Aftercare (293).
 - 7.6% (2,326) of all admissions received Narcotic Treatment Services.
- 8.9% (2,760) were admitted to Long Term Residential Services (greater than 30 days) including Recovery Homes (1,361), Social Model (228), Therapeutic Community (384), 2nd Offender Residential (295), Specialized Residential for Women (379), and Family Shelters (113).
- 4.9% (1,510) of admissions received Other Services including Supportive Housing (259), Structured Outpatient Addiction Programs (963) and Parole Reentry (288).
