

For maintaining an agricultural experiment station at the college, the sum of ten thousand five hundred dollars. Agricultural experiment station.

For collecting and analyzing samples of concentrated commercial feed stuffs, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars. Collecting, etc., samples of concentrated commercial feed stuffs.

For travelling and other necessary expenses of the trustees of the college, a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars. Expenses of trustees.

For printing and binding the report of the trustees of the college, a sum not exceeding eight hundred and fifty dollars. Report of trustees.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE UNIVERSALIST PUBLISHING HOUSE
TO HOLD ADDITIONAL REAL AND PERSONAL ESTATE.

Chap. 20

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. Section two of chapter two hundred and eighty-six of the acts of the year eighteen hundred and seventy-two is hereby amended by striking out the word "two", in the third line, and inserting in place thereof the word: — five, — so as to read as follows: — *Section 2.* Said corporation may hold real and personal property necessary for conducting its business to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars in value. 1872, 286, § 2, amended.

May hold additional real and personal property.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

AN ACT MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR PROTECTING THE
PURITY OF INLAND WATERS.

Chap. 21

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. A sum not exceeding thirty-four thousand dollars is hereby appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury of the Commonwealth from the ordinary revenue, for the services of engineers, chemists, biologists and other persons, and for other expenses made necessary or authorized by chapter seventy-five of the Revised Laws, in protecting the purity of inland waters during the year nineteen hundred and five. Protecting purity of inland waters.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
