AN ACT

In addition to an Act concerning the Returns of Railroad Corporations and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1 SECT. 1. Chapter three hundred and seven of the
2 acts of the current year shall apply to street railway
3 corporations.
