## Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-Five.

### AN ACT

Making additional Appropriations for certain Expenses authorized in eighteen hundred and seventy-four and previous years, and for other purposes.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1    SECT. 1. The sums hereinafter mentioned are  
2 appropriated, to be paid from the ordinary revenue,  
3 except in cases otherwise ordered, for the purposes  
4 specified herein, to wit:—

5    For stationery ordered by the clerk of the  
6 house of representatives, four hundred seventy-  
7 five dollars and seventy-four cents. [Res. 1856,  
8 chap. 74.]

9    For stationery ordered by the clerk of the  
10 senate, eighty-one dollars and eighty-five cents.  
11 [Res. 1856, chap. 74.]

12   For printing and binding ordered by the senate  
13 and house of representatives, eight hundred sixty  
14 dollars and eighty cents. [Res. 1856, chap. 74.]

15 For printing blanks, circulars and the calendar  
16 orders of the day for the senate and house of  
17 representatives, one thousand seven hundred  
18 ninety-eight dollars and seventy-six cents. [Res.  
19 1856, chap. 74.]

20 For contingent expenses of the senate and  
21 house of representatives and necessary expenses  
22 in and about the state house, a sum not exceeding  
23 two hundred and fifty dollars. [Gen. Stat. chap.  
24 14, sect. 62.]

25 For the compensation of committees and com-  
26 missions of the legislature of the previous year,  
27 authorized to sit during the recess, a sum not  
28 exceeding eight thousand dollars. [Res. 1874,  
29 chaps. 79 and 88; Acts 1874, chap. 406.]

30 For the compensation of the engineer and fire-  
31 man employed at the state house, one hundred  
32 ninety-seven dollars and fifty cents. [Acts 1868,  
33 chap. 341; 1873, chap. 373.]

34 For printing ordered by the sergeant-at-arms, a  
35 sum not exceeding one hundred and sixty dollars.  
36 [Res. 1856, chap. 74.]

37 For ordinary repairs in and about the state  
38 house during the previous year, a sum not exceed-  
39 ing nine hundred dollars. [Gen. Stat. chap. 14.]

40 For ventilating the "blue room" and the re-  
41 porter's gallery, as ordered by the senate and  
42 house of representatives, during the previous year,  
43 a sum not exceeding two hundred seventy-seven  
44 dollars and fifty cents.

45 For the steam fire-pump purchased during the  
46 year, a sum not exceeding eight hundred sixty-  
47 three dollars and forty cents. [Gen. Stat. chap.  
48 14.]

49 For carpets and other extraordinary improve-  
50 ments under direction of the commissioners on the  
51 state house, a sum not exceeding nine thousand  
52 eight hundred sixty-three dollars and fifty-one  
53 cents. [Gen. Stat. chap. 14.]

54 For painting and repairing the state house,  
55 under direction of the joint special committee ap-  
56 pointed for that purpose, a sum not exceeding  
57 nineteen thousand five hundred dollars, to be only  
58 upon vouchers approved by a majority of the com-  
59 mittee. [Res. 1874, chap. 76.]

60 For the compensation and mileage of the ex-  
61 ecutive council, one thousand seven hundred and  
62 twelve dollars. [Acts 1872, chap. 328.]

63 For the incidental expenses of the secretary's  
64 department, one thousand and twelve dollars and  
65 fifty-one cents. [Gen. Stat. chap. 14.]

66 For printing the pamphlet edition of the general  
67 acts and resolves of the previous year, five hun-  
68 dred eighty-nine dollars and seventy-five cents.  
69 [Gen. Stat. chap. 3; Acts 1866, chap. 65.]

70 For the publication of the supplement to the  
71 General Statutes of the previous year, four hundred  
72 seventy-seven dollars and fifty-six cents. [Res.  
73 1867, chap. 18.]

74 For printing and binding the memorial volume  
75 of the eulogies upon the late Charles Sumner, as  
76 ordered by the senate and house of representatives,  
77 a sum not exceeding one thousand and twenty-  
78 two dollars and seventy-five cents.

79 For the compensation and expenses of the har-  
80 bor commissioners, two hundred and eighty-six  
81 dollars. [Acts 1866, chap. 149.]

82 For postage and travelling expenses of the

83 secretary of the board of agriculture, one hun-  
84 dred seventy-nine dollars and ninety-four cents.

85 [Gen. Stat., chap. 16.]

86 For incidental expenses of the board of agri-  
87 culture, seven dollars and fifty-seven cents.

88 [Gen. Stat. chap. 16.]

89 For expenses of the bureau of the quarter-  
90 master-general, a sum not exceeding one thou-  
91 sand five hundred sixty dollars and forty-nine  
92 cents. [Acts 1874, chap. 320.]

93 For military accounts, a sum not exceeding  
94 four hundred eighty-one dollars and eighty-eight  
95 cents. [Acts 1874, chap. 320.]

96 For militia compensation, a sum not exceeding  
97 sixteen thousand seven hundred and eight dollars  
98 and twenty-six cents. [Acts 1874, chap. 320.]

99 For quartermasters' supplies, a sum not ex-  
100 ceeding seven hundred eighty-nine dollars and  
101 twenty-five cents. [Acts 1874, chap. 320.]

102 For uniforms for the volunteer militia, a sum  
103 not exceeding one thousand eight hundred ninety-  
104 eight dollars and sixty cents. [Acts 1874,  
105 chap. 320.]

106 For expenses incurred in connection with the  
107 state muster-ground at Framingham, a sum not  
108 exceeding seven hundred thirty-four dollars and  
109 thirty-eight cents. [Acts 1873, chap. 247;  
110 Res. 1874, chap. 63.]

111 For the current expenses of the state alms-  
112 house at Tewksbury, one thousand six hundred  
113 twenty-one dollars and seventy-five cents. [Gen.  
114 Stat. chap. 71.]

115 For the current expenses of the state prison,

116 twelve thousand nine hundred and six dollars  
117 and forty-seven cents. [Acts 1864, chap. 303.]

118 For the reimbursement of the Massachusetts  
119 infant asylum for the support of infants having  
120 no known settlement in the Commonwealth, a  
121 sum not exceeding one thousand nine hundred  
122 seventy-two dollars and twenty-nine cents. [Acts  
123 1870, chap. 136.]

124 For coroners' accounts for eighteen hundred  
125 and seventy-four and previous years, a sum not  
126 exceeding five hundred dollars. [Gen. Stat.  
127 chaps. 157, 175; Acts 1871, chap. 241.]

128 For the salary of the first clerk of the adjutant-  
129 general, one hundred and six dollars and eleven  
130 cents. [Acts 1874, chap. 380.]

131 For the salary of the justice of the first dis-  
132 trict court of Eastern Middlesex, six hundred  
133 sixty-six dollars and sixty-seven cents, and for  
134 the salary of the clerk of said court, three hun-  
135 dred thirty-three dollars and thirty-four cents.

137 In the resolve, chapter eighty-two, of the pre-  
138 vious year, in favor of the widow of the late  
139 George Derby, one thousand three hundred  
140 eighteen dollars and sixty-eight cents.

141 In the resolve, chapter eighty-three, in favor of  
142 James Kelley, George Hayes, Daniel O'Grady,  
143 George C. Buckman, Joseph Simpson and  
144 Thomas Plunkett, three thousand six hundred  
145 dollars, in accordance with the provisions of said  
146 resolve.

147 In the resolve, chapter eighty-five, of the pre-  
148 vious year, in favor of Charles E. Barnard, six

149 hundred dollars, in accordance with the provisions of said resolve.

1   SECT. 2. For the contingent expenses of the  
2 surgeon-general, the sum of one thousand dollars,  
3 in addition to the appropriation heretofore made  
4 for the present year.

1   SECT. 3. This act shall take effect upon its  
2 passage.
