RESOLVE

On the Petition of the Trustees of the Grammar School, in the easterly part of Roxbury.

Resolved, for reasons set forth in said petition, that said trustees be, and they are, hereby authorized to release and convey in fee, by deeds duly executed, all, or any parts, of the lands and real estate belonging to, or held by, said trustees, under the will of Thomas Bell, and which said trustees have heretofore leased for terms of years; and that all deeds and grants of lands and real estate, by said trustees heretofore made, and executed under said will, be, and the same are, hereby confirmed and made valid; and said trustees are hereby directed, and required, to invest the proceeds of sales of all, or any of said lands, as soon as conveniently may be after such sales, in

other real estate, railroad stocks in Massachusetts, state or United States stocks, or to loan the same upon bonds and mortgages, according to the discretion of said trustees, and to appropriate the income thereof for the uses and purposes expressed in said will.
