## Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

### AN ACT

To protect Picnics and other Lawful Gatherings in  
Licensed Groves.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives  
in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the  
same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Whoever, during the time of  
2 holding a picnic or other lawful gathering in any  
3 grove licensed in accordance with the provisions  
4 of chapter three hundred and nine of the acts of  
5 the year eighteen hundred and eighty-five, and  
6 within one-half mile thereof, hawks or peddles  
7 goods, wares or merchandise, or establishes or  
8 maintains a tent, booth, vehicle or building for  
9 vending provisions or refreshments, or furnishes  
10 shelter and food for or has the care of horses for  
11 pay, without the consent of the person or persons  
12 to whom is granted the license for such grove, or  
13 engages in gaming or horse-racing, or exhibits or  
14 offers to exhibit any show or play, shall forfeit for

15 each offence a sum not exceeding twenty dollars:  
16 *provided*, that any person having his regular  
17 place of business within such limits shall not be  
18 hereby required to suspend his business.

1     SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its  
2 passage.
