AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE IMPOSITION OF MARKET RATE INTEREST ON WAGES NOT TIMELY PAID.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

- 1 Chapter 149 of the General Laws is hereby amended by
- 2 inserting after Section 148 the following sentence: In addition,
- 3 notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special law to the
- 4 contrary, wages due pursuant to this section but unpaid for thirty-
- 5 five days shall have the market rate annual interest rate applied
- 6 thereto retroactive to the original date due.
