AN ACT RELATIVE TO OPTIONS ON RETIREMENT AND THE SURVIVOR BENEFITS OF CERTAIN SPOUSES AND CHILDREN.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 12 of Chapter 32, as appearing in the 1994 Official
2 Edition, is hereby amended by striking out in line 185 the word
3 “two” and in line 186 the words “hundred and fifty dollars” and
4 inserting in place thereof the words: — five hundred dollars; and
5 striking out in line 198 the words “two hundred and fifty dollars
6 and inserting in place thereof: — the words “five hundred dol-
7 lars”.

8 Section 12B of Chapter 32, as appearing in the 1994 Official
9 Edition, is hereby amended by striking out in line 16 the word
10 “one” and in line 17 by striking out the words “hundred and
11 twenty dollars” and inserting in place thereof the words “one hun-
12 dred and fifty dollars”; and in line 18 by striking out the words
13 “ninety dollars” and inserting in place thereof: — “one hundred
14 dollars”; and in line 29 striking out the words “one hundred and
15 twenty dollars” and inserting in place thereof the words: — “one
16 hundred and fifty dollars”; and in line 30 by striking out the words
17 “ninety dollars” and in place thereof: — the words “one hundred
18 dollars”.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I, Section 8, Clause 18

1. That the Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and to provide for the common defence and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

2. That the Congress shall have power to borrow money on the credit of the United States.

3. That the Congress shall have power to regulate commerce with foreign nations, among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes.

4. That the Congress shall have power to establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and consistent regulations therein.

5. That the Congress shall have power to establish an uniform system of laws, and to appoint judges and clerks of the courts of law, and to provide for the enforcement of the same.

6. That the Congress shall have power to constitute tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court.

7. That the Congress shall have power to define and punish the crimes of piracy and felonies on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations.

8. That the Congress shall have power to define and punish counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States.

9. That the Congress shall have power to coin money, to regulate the value thereof, and to fix the standard of weights and measures.

10. That the Congress shall have power to grant letters of marque and reprisal, and to make rules concerning the same.

11. That the Congress shall have power to declare war, to authorize letters of marque and reprisal, and to make rules concerning the same.
