AN ACT RELATIVE TO DISABILITY RETIREMENT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Subdivision (5) of section 7 of chapter 32 of the General Laws,
2 as appearing in the 1998 Official Edition, is hereby amended by
3 adding at the end thereof the following paragraph:—

4 The pension portion of an allowance paid for a disability retire-
5 ment granted to a member under this section shall, upon the peti-
6 tion of the retirement board paying such allowance, be probated
7 by the actuary if he determines 50 per cent of such allowance to
8 be attributable to an injury suffered while a member of a different
9 retirement system. Such proration shall apply to all such petitions
10 filed on or after June 1, 1999.

Section 10

Power to issue notes
