RESOLVE on the Petition of Stephen Taft, Treasurer of Mendon.

*Resolved*, for reasons set forth in the said petition, that there be allowed and paid, out of the treasury of the Commonwealth, to Stephen Taft, treasurer of Mendon, the sum of four dollars and thirty-five cents, in full for monies paid by him for bounty on wheat, and that a warrant be drawn therefor. [*Approved by the Governor, Feb. 27, 1841.*]

RESOLVE relating to the Public Archives.

*Resolved*, That the sum of one thousand dollars be, and the same is hereby, appropriated to be expended by the secretary of the Commonwealth, under the direction of his excellency the governor, in providing for the preservation and security of the papers and documents in the archives of the Commonwealth, and that a warrant be drawn accordingly. [*Approved by the Governor, Feb. 27, 1841.*]

RESOLVE on the Accounts of the Land Agent.

*Resolved*, That George W. Coffin, land agent of the Commonwealth be, and he hereby is, discharged from the payment of the sum of fifty-nine thousand and fifty-six dollars and twenty-four cents, the receipt of which is acknowledged in his account with the Commonwealth to the thirty-first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty, inclusive. [*Approved by the Governor, Feb. 27, 1841.*]

**Chap. 24.**

An alien con-

estate.

RESOLVE on the Petition of James Salter, of Boston.

*Resolved*, for reasons set forth in the said petition, that the said James Salter be, and he hereby is, authorized to hold, to him and his heirs and assigns, the following parcel of land, situate in Boston, in the county of Suffolk, bounded and described as follows, to wit: a certain messuage, situate on Prince street, and bounded on said street, northeastwardly, thirty-one feet, more or less; eastwardly on land now or late of Samuel Treat, seventy feet, more or less; southwestwardly on a lane or passage-way, leading from the mills, so called, thirty-one feet; northwestwardly by land late of William Payne, and now of J. Nash, sixty-eight feet, extending from said lane or passage-way, to said Prince street, being the same estate which was formerly occupied by Joshua Bentley, and was, (among other tracts of land) granted to William Stokes and others, by a Resolve passed on or about the fourteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, together with the buildings and other appurtenances to the same belonging; and the said James Salter is further authorized to sell and convey the above described parcel of real estate, or any part thereof, in fee simple, or otherwise, and to dispose of the same, or any part thereof, by last will or otherwise, as fully and effectually, to all intents and purposes, as if he were a citizen of the United States.
