AN ACT LIMITING THE NUMBER OF TRAPS THAT MAY BE USED.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 68 of chapter 131 of the General Laws,
- 2 as amended, is hereby further amended by inserting
- 3 after clause (o), as appearing in section 1 of chapter
- 4 758 of the acts of 1949, the following clause:—
- 5 (p) To have in use more than one hundred traps.

The Constitution of the Republic

Article I. Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators in that State.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or change in any or all of those Things the Times, Places and Manner of holding such Elections, except the Place of Elections for Representatives.

Section 5. The Congress shall have Power to regulate the Election and Term of Service of the Senators and Representatives, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.
