AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE DISPOSITION OF FINES COLLECTED FROM PERSONS CONVICTED OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 84 of chapter 272 of the General
2 Laws, as appearing in the Tercentenary Edition, is
3 hereby amended by striking out all after the word
4 "notice" in line 3, so as to read as follows:—*Sec-*
5 *tion 84.* Sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables and
6 police officers shall prosecute all violations of sections
7 seventy-seven to eighty-one, inclusive, which come
8 to their notice.

1 SECTION 2. Section 85 of said chapter 272 is
2 hereby repealed.

The Constitution of the United States

In the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty

and the first of the Independence of the United States

the following Constitution was proposed to the People of the United States

1. We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do hereby ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

2. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

3. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

4. No Representative shall hold Office longer than seven Years, and no Person shall be Representative who shall not, when elected, have seven Years since he attained to the Age of twenty five Years, and seven Years since he became seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and when elected shall have been seven Years a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen.

5. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for a Term of six Years; and each Senator shall hold Office until he or she be replaced.
