AN ACT LIMITING THE SERVICE OF A LEGISLATOR TO THE GENERAL COURT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 No Legislator serving a term of office in the General Court of the
- 2 Commonwealth may serve in an elected official capacity in another
- 3 city, town or county while serving the General Court.
