AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE LICENSING OF PRIVATE BUSINESS SCHOOLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 93 of the General Laws is hereby
2 amended by striking out section 21A and inserting a new sec-
3 tion:—

4 *Section 21A.* The term "private trade school" shall, in sec-
5 tions twenty-one to twenty-one D, inclusive, mean a school
6 maintained, or classes conducted, for the purpose of teaching
7 any business, trade or industrial occupation for profit or for a
8 tuition charge, but shall not include a school or college reg-
9 ularly chartered and authorized by the laws of the common-
10 wealth to grant degrees, an endowed school which offers ap-
11 proved courses without profit, or a school exclusively engaged
12 in training physically handicapped persons or a school con-
13 ducted by any person for the education and training of his own
14 employees. In the licensing of new schools or the acceptance of
15 new courses, the requirements with respect to courses of in-
16 struction in the apprenticeable skilled trades shall be de-
17 termined by the board of education with the advice of the de-
18 partment of labor and industries.

1 SECTION 2. Section 22 of said chapter 93, as most recently
2 amended by section 3 of chapter 583 of the acts of 1941, is
3 hereby further amended by adding after the word "correspond-
4 ence" in line 3 the words:— or trade.
