### RESOLVE RELATIVE TO IMPROVING THE ENFORCEMENT OF ILLEGAL OUT-OF-STATE REGISTRATION BY COMMERCIAL VEHICLES.

14 organizations.

The Government of Texas

in the year 1856

- 1. The Government of Texas is organized into three branches: the Executive, the Legislative, and the Judicial.
- 2. The Executive branch is headed by the Governor, who is elected by the people for a term of four years.
- 3. The Legislative branch is headed by the Legislature, which consists of the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- 4. The Judicial branch is headed by the Supreme Court, which is composed of five Justices.
- 5. The Governor has the power to execute the laws, to veto bills passed by the Legislature, and to appoint and remove judges.
- 6. The Legislature has the power to make laws, to appropriate money, and to impeach and remove judges.
- 7. The Supreme Court has the power to interpret the laws, to review the actions of the Executive and Legislative branches, and to hear appeals from lower courts.
- 8. The Governor, the Legislature, and the Supreme Court are all elected by the people.
- 9. The Governor is elected in the year 1856.
- 10. The Legislature is elected in the year 1856.
- 11. The Supreme Court is elected in the year 1856.
