1 *Ordered*, That the committee on Public Service be authorized
2 to sit during the recess of the General Court to make an
3 investigation and study of Senate documents numbered 1056,
4 1058, 1067, 1084, 1086, 1091, 1092, 1098 and 1105; and House
5 documents numbered 420, 423, 634, 803, 807, 975, 977, 1370, 1381,
6 1399, 1578, 1972, 1976, 1978, 1981, 2165, 2175, 2538, 2874, 3268,
7 3275, 3437, 3783, 4314, 4316, 4755, 4933 and 4938, as relates to
8 public pensions, and other related matters.

9 Said committee shall report to the General Court the results
10 of its investigation and study, and its recommendations, if any,
11 together with drafts of legislation necessary to carry such
12 recommendations into effect, by filing the same with the Clerk
13 of the House of Representatives on or before the last Wednesday
14 in December, nineteen hundred and ninety-two.
