
To accompany the petition of Silvio O. Conte for legislation to recognize loyal and devoted services of employees of the Commonwealth. Public Service.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Eight.

AN ACT TO RECOGNIZE LOYAL AND DEVOTED SERVICES OF EMPLOYEES OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Be it enacted that a fund be established through
2 the department of administration and finance, based on antici-
3 pated annual budgetary requirements furnished by the depart-
4 ment of personnel and standardization for the purpose of
5 recognizing loyal and devoted services of employees of the
6 commonwealth by presenting to them a valued service pin,
7 upon the occasion of certain milestones in their career, said
8 award to be requisitioned by the authorized department head
9 through the state purchasing department, in conformance
10 with requirements as specified in section two.

1 SECTION 2. The department head is hereby authorized
2 and empowered on the written request and approval of the
3 department of personnel and standardization, an approved
4 copy of which will be attached to the requisition submitted
5 to the state purchasing department:—

6 (a) To present an award of a service pin to an employee
7 who has completed twenty-five years of faithful service, the
8 value of which is not to exceed twenty-five dollars.

9 (b) To present an award of a service pin to an employee
10 who has completed thirty-five years of faithful service, the
11 value of which is not to exceed fifty dollars.

The committee on the subject of the proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of New York, created by Chapter 100 of the Laws of 1901, and which was continued from year to year, has the honor to report to the Senate the following amendments to the Constitution of the State of New York:

ARTICLE I. OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

SECTION 1. The Executive Power shall be vested in the Governor.

ARTICLE II. OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

SECTION 1. The Legislative Power shall be vested in the Senate and the Assembly.

SECTION 2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four members, to be elected by the qualified electors of the State.

SECTION 3. The Assembly shall be composed of fifty members, to be elected by the qualified electors of the State.

SECTION 4. The Governor shall hold office for a term of four years, and shall be eligible for re-election.

SECTION 5. The Governor shall have the honor and the duty to see that the laws are faithfully executed.

SECTION 6. The Governor shall have the power to pardon and commute the sentences of criminals.

SECTION 7. The Governor shall have the power to appoint and remove officers of the State.

SECTION 8. The Governor shall have the power to call the Legislature into special session.

SECTION 9. The Governor shall have the power to grant reprieves and commutations of sentence.

SECTION 10. The Governor shall have the power to grant pardons and commutations of sentence.
