

Accompanying the petition of John F. Carr and another relative to the amount of pension payable to janitors of public schools. Social Welfare. January 20.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Two.

AN ACT

Relative to Amount of Pension for School Janitors.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section forty-four of chapter thirty-two of the Gen-
2 eral Laws is hereby amended by striking out, in lines
3 nine and ten, the words "five hundred", and substitut-
4 ing the words:—seven hundred and fifty,—so as to
5 read as follows:—*Section 44.* The school committee,
6 official, board or other body having control of janitors
7 employed in public schools of cities and towns which
8 accept this section, as provided in the following section,
9 or have accepted corresponding provisions of earlier laws,
10 may retire, with an annual pension, any janitor so em-
11 ployed who has reached the age of sixty, after com-
12 pleting a service of not less than twenty-five years, and
13 is physically incapacitated. The pension shall be one
14 half the compensation to which the pensioner would
15 have been entitled for full employment during the last
16 year of his service, but not more than seven hundred
17 and fifty dollars a year, and shall be payable out of the
18 appropriation for the support of public schools, mainte-
19 nance of school buildings or payment of janitors.
