The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty-one.

**AN ACT TO ALTER THE COMPOSITION OF THE RETIREMENT LAW
COMMISSION.**

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 102 of Chapter 6 of the General Laws is hereby
2 amended by striking said Section in its entirety and substitut-
3 ing in its place the following: —

4 *Section 102.* There shall be a retirement law commission
5 of seven members, consisting of the executive secretary of
6 the state board of retirement, the executive secretary of the
7 teachers retirement board, *a member of the Massachusetts*
8 *Contributory Retirement Systems, Inc., a city or town treas-*
9 *urer and three other members, all five of which shall be ap-*
10 *pointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the*
11 *council.* The members shall serve without compensation but
12 shall receive their necessary expenses incurred in the dis-
13 charge of their official duties. The chairman of said com-
14 mission shall be designated from time to time by the gover-
15 nor. Upon the expiration of the term of an appointive mem-
16 ber, his successor shall be appointed in the manner aforesaid
17 for a term of five years.

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The Constitution of the Association

As amended by the Association at its annual meeting in 1970

ARTICLE I
NAME AND PURPOSE

Section 1. The name of the Association shall be the American Medical Association, and its purpose shall be to advance the science and practice of medicine, to promote the health of the people, and to protect the public interest.

Section 2. The Association shall be organized into chapters in each State, Territory, and the District of Columbia, and into local societies in each of these jurisdictions.

Section 3. The Association shall have the right to make and alter its bylaws, subject to the approval of the House of Delegates, and to suspend or expel any member who is guilty of conduct unbecomingly a physician or who is otherwise disqualified from the practice of medicine.

Section 4. The Association shall have the right to make and alter its rules of procedure, subject to the approval of the House of Delegates, and to suspend or expel any member who is guilty of conduct unbecomingly a physician or who is otherwise disqualified from the practice of medicine.

Section 5. The Association shall have the right to make and alter its regulations, subject to the approval of the House of Delegates, and to suspend or expel any member who is guilty of conduct unbecomingly a physician or who is otherwise disqualified from the practice of medicine.

Section 6. The Association shall have the right to make and alter its resolutions, subject to the approval of the House of Delegates, and to suspend or expel any member who is guilty of conduct unbecomingly a physician or who is otherwise disqualified from the practice of medicine.

Section 7. The Association shall have the right to make and alter its amendments, subject to the approval of the House of Delegates, and to suspend or expel any member who is guilty of conduct unbecomingly a physician or who is otherwise disqualified from the practice of medicine.
