The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Eight.

Ordered, That the Committee on Commerce and Labor is hereby authorized and directed to investigate and study the subject matter of current senate documents numbered 44 relative to further regulating the scope of the summer employment lottery program; 50 relative to providing for full employment in Massachusetts; 52 relative to establishing a Massachusetts economic development bank; 998 relative to prohibiting the retirement of certain employees because of age; and house documents numbered 355 relative to establishing a Massachusetts public employment program; 1265 relative to prohibiting mandatory retirement for public and private employees; 1327 relative to further regulating youth employment in the Commonwealth; 1513 relative to further increasing the industrial development of cities and towns and stimulating employment therein; 3245 relative to establishing a youth for environmental survival corps; 3446 relative to establishing a state-wide youth employment council; 3648 relative to that provision be made for full employment for the youth of the Commonwealth; 3823 relative to providing full employment for youth in the Commonwealth; 3992 relative to that provision be made for summer jobs for persons aged fourteen to eighteen years; 4191 relative to prohibiting discrimination in employment due to age; 4352 relative to establishing a youth community development finance corporation in order to encourage investment for the expansion of industry already in existence and to develop new industry in order to grant additional employment and 4834 relative to summer employment of students fifteen to eighteen years of age. Said Committee shall report to the general court the results of its investigation and study and its recommendations, if any, together with drafts of such legislation as may be necessary to carry such recommendations into effect, by filing the same with the clerk of the House of Representatives on or before December, thirty-first, nineteen hundred and seventy-eight.
