AN ACT PROVIDING THAT COUNTY RETIREMENT SYSTEM BOARDS
SUBMIT TO COUNTY COMMISSIONERS DETAILED INFORMATION.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in
General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as
follows:*

1 Section 38 of chapter 35 of the General Laws is hereby
2 amended by striking out the second sentence and inserting in
3 place thereof the following sentence:— On or before December
4 fifteenth in each year, the head of each department or institution
5 and each board, including the county retirement system or other
6 agencies whose activities are maintained or supported wholly or
7 in part by county funds, shall submit to the county com-
8 missioners, in writing a statement of their requirements for the
9 ensuing fiscal year, including number and cost of personnel,
10 quantities and estimated cost of supplies and equipment and any
11 other proposed expenditures, in sufficient detail to enable said
12 commissioners to explain any increase or decrease as compared
13 with the appropriation of the then current fiscal year.
