## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

---

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Five.

---

An Act further regulating the Powers of the Salisbury Water Supply Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter two hundred and forty-three of the Special  
2 Acts of the year nineteen hundred and fifteen is  
3 hereby amended by striking out section five and  
4 inserting in place thereof the following section:—

5 *Section 5.* Said corporation may distribute water  
6 through the town of Salisbury or any part thereof,  
7 may make such contracts with said town or with any  
8 fire district now or hereafter established therein, or  
9 with any individual or corporation, to supply water  
10 for the extinguishment of fires or for other purposes  
11 as may be agreed upon, and, subject to the powers  
12 vested in the board of gas and electric light commis-  
13 sioners, may regulate the use of water so distributed,  
14 may fix rates to be paid for the use of the same, and  
15 may maintain and operate a system of sewage dis-  
16 posal and contract with said town, or with any indi-  
17 vidual or corporation, relative to the same.
