RESOLVE INCREASING THE SCOPE OF THE SPECIAL COMMISSION ON SOLID AND HAZARDOUS WASTE.

1 *Resolved*, that the special commission established by Chapter
2 704 of the Acts of 1979, and most recently revived and continued
3 by Chapter 1 of the Resolves of 1987, shall, in the course of its
4 investigation and study, consider the subject matter of the current
5 Senate documents numbered 949, legislation making provision for
6 an investigation and study by a special commission relative to the
7 disposal of plastic material; and current House documents
8 numbered 417, legislation to authorize county commissioners and
9 the department of environmental quality engineering to establish,
10 operate, maintain and control facilities for energy resource
11 recovery and for the collection, transfer, processing and disposal
12 of solid waste; 617, legislation relating to the prevention of,
13 response to and compensation for releases of oil and hazardous
14 material; 620, legislation making an appropriation to reimburse
15 the town of Hull for complying with a local mandate; 621,
16 legislation providing assistance for the cleaning up of certain
17 hazardous waste; 804, legislation regarding solid waste and
18 hazardous waste disposal facilities; 806, legislation further
19 regulating sanitary landfills; 996, legislation to require disclosure
