AN ACT CREATING A COMMISSION IN THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION
TO REVIEW THE BILINGUAL EDUCATION PROGRAM.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 The commissioner of the Department of Education is hereby
- 2 authorized and directed to form a special commission within said
- 3 department to review and study the rules and regulations govern-
- 4 ing the provision of bilingual education in the public schools
- 5 within the commonwealth, and to evaluate the impact and effect of
- 6 such programs upon municipalities.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I, Section 8, Clause 18

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any of the Departments thereof.

The Congress shall have Power to make and enforce Laws, and to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes.

The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes, to borrow Money on the Credit of the United States, to define and punish the Offences against the Law of Nations, to define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations, to regulate the Coinage, Weights and Measures, to establish Post Offices and Post Roads, to promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries, to constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court, to exercise the Power of Pardons, except in Cases of Impeachment, to regulate the Militia, to provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, to suppress Insurrections, and to repel Invasions, and to make all Laws necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any of the Departments thereof.
