AN ACT AUTHORIZING STEPHEN D. GRACE TO TAKE A CIVIL SERVICE EXAM FOR POLICE OFFICER NOTWITHSTANDING THE MAXIMUM AGE RETIREMENT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or
2 special law or rule to the contrary regulating the maximum age of
3 applying for appointment as a police officer, Stephen D. Grace
4 shall be eligible to take the next open, competitive exam for
5 appointment to the position of police officer and provided he meets
6 all other requirements he shall be eligible for certification and
7 appointment to said position.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

In the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-One

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

SECTION 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature of the State for which they are elected, and they shall hold their Offices for Terms of Years, the Number of which shall be determined by the Legislature of the State in which they are elected, but no Senator shall be elected for a longer Term than nine Years, and no Senator shall be elected who was not at the Time of his Election seven Years of Age and fourteen Years a Citizen of the United States, and seven Years a Citizen of the State in which he is elected, and which he, when elected, shall have attained.

SECTION 4. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
