The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty-Five.

RESOLVE ESTABLISHING A SPECIAL COMMISSION TO STUDY THE APPLICATION OF COMPARABLE WORTH STANDARDS TO THE COMMONWEALTH'S EMPLOYEES.

1 *Resolved*, That a special commission to consist of two members of
2 the Senate, four members of the House and three persons to be
3 appointed by the Governor, two of whom shall be representatives
4 of certified state employees unions, is hereby established for the
5 purpose of making a study relative to the remuneration of em-
6 ployees of the Commonwealth and the possible application of
7 comparable worth standards to the job classifications and wage
8 scales of said employees.

9 Said commission may involve in advisory roles such persons,
10 organizations or public and private institutions as it may determine
11 as appropriate and may travel within and without the common-
12 wealth. Said commission may call upon officials of the common-
13 wealth or its various subdivisions and may also call upon officials of
14 the federal government and its various agencies and departments
15 for such information as it may desire in the course of its investiga-
16 tion and study. Said commission shall report to the general court
17 the results of its investigation and study, and its recommendations,
18 if any, together with drafts of any statutes necessary to carry its
19 recommendations into effect by filing the same with the clerk of the
20 house of representatives on or before the first Wednesday of
21 November, nineteen hundred and eighty-five.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

As amended by the several Amendments thereto

Approved by the Senate and House of Representatives
of the United States of America on September 13, 1787.

Article I
Section 1
All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2
The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3
The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for a Term of six Years; and they shall hold their Offices until their Successors be chosen.
