The committee on Ways and Means, to whom were referred the Bill further regulating the procedures for importing inland fish and wildlife into the Commonwealth (Senate, No. 790, amended); the Bill allowing certain creditable service in the teachers' retirement system for certain teachers who have served in overseas dependent schools operated by the United States Government or the public schools of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico (Senate, No. 973); the recommitted Bill authorizing the Board of Trustees of Southeastern Massachusetts University to transfer certain buildings to Bristol Community College (House, No. 540); the recommitted Bill authorizing the Registrar of Motor Vehicles to construct a new facility for the branch office for the Registry of Motor Vehicles in the city of Fall River (House, No. 798); the recommitted Bill establishing certain educational qualifications of applicants for license as real estate brokers (House, No. 1717); the Bill to amend the law relative to the acquisition or control of commercial banks and bank holding companies (House, No. 38); the Bill authorizing the Commissioner of Banks to make investigations to determine whether the small loan law is being violated (House, No. 41); the Bill providing for compensation for loss of personal property in certain takings by eminent domain (House, No. 70); the Bill defining the investigative powers of the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination and authorizing the commission to issue interrogatories and to reproduce evidence in connection with complaints of education discrimination (House, No. 113); the Bill relating to the licensing of clinical laboratories (House, No. 198); the Bill increasing the amount of annual pension payable to certain persons retired for physical or mental disability caused by illness or injury incurred in performance of duty (House, No. 226); the Bill authorizing the Commissioner of Public Safety to prescribe methods for the performance of chemical tests and analyses to measure intoxication, and providing for the certification of persons authorized to perform such tests and analyses and the certification of all devices for such tests (House, No. 236);

Dickson, Paul Maurice Murphy and others for legislation to prohibit certain uses of poisonous chemical agents within the Commonwealth except under permits issued by the Commissioner of Public Health; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4868) of Robert B. Ambler, M. Joseph Manning, Joseph J. Semensi and Alan Paul Danovitch for legislation to require the photographing of persons admitted to state mental hospitals; and the report of the Department of Community Affairs (under Section 3 of Chapter 23B of the General Laws) relative to community and environmental development and governmental roles and responsibilities (House, No. 4942), report recommending that the accompanying order (House, No. 6018) ought to be adopted.
